

Adolph Mechner Physician, 91

Dr. Adolph Mechner, a retired physician, died of pneumonia last Wednesday at Lenox Hill Hospital. He was 91 years old and lived in Manhattan.

Dr. Mechner, who was educated in Vienna, was a prominent physician there and had developed a medical treatment for hay fever. He fled the Nazis in 1938, going first to Havana and then to Brooklyn, where he practiced medicine from 1940 until 1976.

Surviving are his wife, the former Hedy Zeigler; a son, Francis, of Chappaqua, N.Y.; a daughter, Johanna Cooper of Pleasantville, N.Y., and eight grandchildren.

New Collections in the LBI Archives

MEMOIR COLLECTION GROWS

While the LBI regularly receives additions to its extensive collection of memoirs, two of the most recent donations are particularly interesting.

Dr. Berta Landré née Allerhand (1902 Privos, Moravia-1982 Vienna), a teacher and journalist, calls her memoirs Durchs Sieb der Zeit gefallen: Jedes Menschenleben ist ein Roman. The 1800-page manuscript was handwritten in German between the years 1972 and 1978 and covers Dr. Landré's life from 1902 until 1950.

In 1924 Dr. Landré received a doctorate degree in geography in Vienna; she then taught at the Chajes Gymnasium in Vienna. After her release from Theresienstadt, she continued to work in Germany, writing for the *Juedische Allgemeine Zeitung* in Duesseldorf and the *Frankfurter Allgemeine Zeitung*. In 1968 she returned to Vienna, where she lived until her recent death.

Dr. Landré recounts her political activities as a member of the *Blau-Weiss* youth group and the socialist movement, her professional career, and her personal experiences as wife and mother. Her memoirs are a miniature social history of the first fifty years of this century.

In "My Family Biography," Dr. Adolph Mechner (1897-) has written an extensive narrative about his family and their experiences, beginning with his great-grandmother, who was born in Safed when Palestine was under Turkish rule. Dr. Mechner's own life begins in Czernowitz in the Bukowina, a province of the Austrian Hungarian Empire, situated near

the Russian border. The end of his school days coincided with the start of World War I; Mechner fought in the Austrian Army—first on the Russian front, later on the Italian front—and was twice wounded. After the war he studied medicine, and received his degree at the University of Vienna in 1925.

A practicing physician in Vienna until 1938, Dr. Mechner then emigrated to Cuba, where his wife and daughter joined him; finally also his ten-year-old son and his wife's sister and her husband, who were able to leave France just before the Nazi takeover. The entire family emigrated to the United States in three groups in 1944. Dr. Mechner practiced medicine in Brooklyn, New York, until 1975; at age eighty-six, he now lives in retirement in Manhattan.

This 600-page, four-volume biography is written in English and fully indexed. Chapters deal with the general history and geography of the localities in which he as well as his family lived. There are accounts of his professional and personal experiences and a 200-page appendix written by various family members.

The work is illustrated throughout with copies of photos, documents, letters, family trees and maps. It is a total biography in every sense.
